

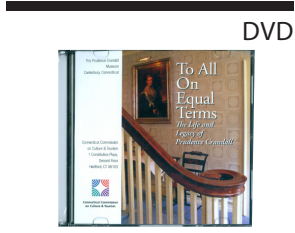

THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF PRUDENCE CRANDALL**

The story of Prudence Crandall, Connecticut’s State heroine, features prominently in civil rights history.

In 1833, Miss Crandall opened the first academy for “young ladies and misses of color” in New England in the Connecticut town of Canterbury. Miss Crandall was arrested and jailed; she and her students were harassed, but classes continued until a midnight attack by a mob forced Miss Crandall to close the school. Her legacy and dream for education “to all on equal terms” continue to be relevant today.
